Transitions

It gives me great pleasure as my final President's Message to introduce your new CSMTA President Dr. Emily Book McGree, NCTM, who will assume the role later this month! Emily has worked closely with me during my tenure, ensuring a smooth transition. And now a little bit about Emily:

Originally from Ohio, the daughter of two elementary school teachers, Emily was drawn first to the viola in elementary school, then subsequently to the piano. Following degrees from Ohio Wesleyan and Louisiana State, she earned her doctorate in piano performance from the University of Colorado, where I was lucky enough to serve as her advisor. After graduation Emily was Education Director at Boulder's Parlando School for Musical Arts for a decade, before assuming her current position at University of Denver Lamont School of Music, where she runs both the Piano Pedagogy and Piano Preparatory programs. I posed a few questions to Emily:

AC: Tell us about your work at DU and beyond.

EBM: This will be my fifth year at DU, and in that time we've introduced a new Piano Pedagogy Certificate that is open to all graduate students at Lamont as well as anyone local from the community who is interested in some additional professional development. The Piano Prep program has grown by over 200% and now employs recent graduates from Lamont. I'm also longtime co-chair of the RMM (Recreational Music Making) track for MTNA's Pedagogy Saturday, and this Fall I have a course coming out for the Frances Clark Center. (Emily also runs a successful independent piano studio in Lafayette.)

AC: Which recent CSMTA efforts are you most proud of?

EBM: I am super proud of our DEI advancements!

AC: What vision might you have for your term as president?

EBM: A major priority will be to try to increase younger membership and foster relationships between collegiates/ young alumni and local chapters as well as CSMTA as a whole.

I am also interested in increasing programming for the "regular" (or I might say recreational!) student, finding additional ways for socialization and connection among CSMTA members, and potentially helping to retool Notes & News to something that's both easier to produce and



easier for members to digest in bite-size chunks in hopes of increasing readership.

AC: How has MTNA been important to you?

EBM: MTNA was huge for me as a collegiate and young alum as I developed my career path and learned how to teach effectively. My hope is really to pay it forward (or back!) to the organizations that helped me develop in so many ways. This is one of the reasons collegiate and young alumni involvement is important to me!

AC: Anything else to add?

EBM: I am proud of the way our executive team is functioning so collaboratively, and I believe that this will help make our upcoming transitions flow a bit more seamlessly. I look forward to the next two years!

DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION CORNER

CHEE-HWA TAN, VP FOR DEI



Dear colleagues and friends,

I am pleased and excited to share that MTNA has just revised the title of the national position of VP for DEI to that of *VP for Representation and Advocacy*. At the upcoming state conference, we are requesting that you, our membership, allow an amendment of the bylaws to change the title of the CSMTA position

from VP for DEI to that of Representation and Advocacy to line up with that at the national level. It is my hope that there will be support for this practical and more accessible title for the position!

Ultimately, whatever we name the position, I challenge each of us to ask ourselves the following question: "Is there still a need in the music world we inhabit for awareness and growth in the areas of diversification, equitable approaches and increased accessibility in teaching and learning practices? More important, does this growth mindset impact the ability of our students to have joyful and relevant music making experiences for life?" Over the years, the innumerable conversations I have had with music parents and adults who dream of playing an instrument and their personal stories of past music study experiences, I would propose that the honest answer to the questions above is a "Yes." We are unfortunately not yet to the point where every student is able to fully experience the life changing benefits of music study.

In the words of Frances Clark, the mother of American piano pedagogy and the first to expand the piano canon in the 1950's by commissioning contemporary didactic music from composers like Alexander Tansman and Ross Lee Finney: "Teach the student first, the music second, and the instrument third." Knowing Frances' pedagogical philosophy and values, I think we can reword this to convey what she was truly getting at: "SEE the student first ..."

What does it look like to first "see" the student - as a complete, creative and unique individual with their own feelings, goals and dreams - versus first seeing our personal agenda for them and the knowledge and skills what we want to impart to them? This is where I believe that an understanding of a deeper and broader meaning of inclusion, diversity, equity and accessibility – representation and advocacy for the unique needs of the student - can help us identify ways to inspire our students and tailor our approach to each student's needs. Ultimately, I hope that our bottom line is always to contribute toward a lifetime of music ownership. This goal can be achieved in myriad ways -- diversifying repertoire, including collaborative opportunities, making sight reading and creativity

accessible, or finding ways to make our studio more of a melting pot of interests, abilities and backgrounds. The list goes on. If all we did was identify one thing we can do, we will have a larger impact than we can imagine. I have experimented with this in my own studio, and it has been a game changer for both my students and for myself!

As I wrap up my year in this position, I encourage all of us to dare to explore this idea of "seeing" our students and ourselves with a fresh perspective in relation to music, and to reflect on the reasons why we teach and why music matters. In doing so, we will be investing in a future generation of music hobbyists, practitioners, artists, and supporters of the Arts who can return to their music practice with feelings of connection, anticipation, curiosity and ownership.

Liane Rockley, Colorado's 2025 MTNA Foundation Fellow

The Executive Board is pleased to announce that Liane Rockley will be their nominee for MTNA Foundation Fellow for 2025. Liane will be honored at the National Conference in March, in Minneapolis. Liane has served as treasurer of CSMTA for the past 6 years.

Liane Rockley was born in Colorado, in the Green Mountain area. She is the daughter of Phyllis and Ron Pieffer. She has a sister named Elaine, who lives in Oregon now. Liane attended the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory, graduating with a Bachelor of Music in Flute performance. When she returned to Denver she began teaching flute at Rockley Music, and inherited flute students from her own

teacher, Betsy Nelms, who was moving. She also worked part-time in the band department at Rockley. She taught flute for 10 years, focusing on teaching Suzuki flute with her students.

Her mom, Phyllis, also taught her how to play the piano. Liane views playing piano now as her "relaxing time".

Liane joined MTNA in 1994 and was very active in the Foothills MTA when she was teaching. She has been a member

of 7-8 local associations of CSMTA over the years and loved introducing new music each fall in sessions that she presented to the locals.

Liane is married to Tobin Rockley. His oldest is Damien, 32, a training commercial pilot in Colorado. They also have Tyler who lives in Alaska with his wife Lorel. He is a mining engineer. Tyler and Lorel have Petra, a daughter who is 3 and are expecting another in October. Liane and Tobin's 3rd son, Aslan, lives in Colorado with his wife Haley, and son, Theo, who is 4 months old.

When Rockley Music was at its strongest, it had 40 employees. Now there are 7 employees. Rockley Music opened

in 1946 and moved in 2022, after selling their long-time location on West Colfax. They now have all their products in a warehouse in Wheat Ridge, where you can visit by appointment, and purchase pianos and orchestral strings.

Tobin Rockley started their Foundation in 2007. It is a non-profit that helps schools, colleges, and universities in Colorado. They soon branched out to other states. They now do fundraising in 34 states and have raised over \$41 million in donations. Tobin travels 30 weekends a year for the foundation, and Liane works on the accounting end of the foundation.

Liane has played flute and piccolo with the Lakewood Symphony for the past 20 years, and is also president of the

Board of Directors for the Lakewood Symphony. She is retiring from her role of treasurer for CSMTA after 6 years of service, and the executive board thought the MTNA Foundation Fellow was a fitting tribute to all her work as treasurer. Liane said it has been an honor to serve CSMTA as treasurer.

Now we need to make sure that Liane can be honored as Colorado's Foundation Fellow. We need to raise \$1500. Local

of a Rotary Graduate Fellowship. Mary Ann's extensive experience in piano pedagogy includes many years of traditional teaching (college level and home studio), study of the Suzuki method (Books 1-7, Repertoire Extension classes), and training in Taubman technique (eleven summers Amherst and Williams colleges, facilitator of numerous video workshops in Colorado). She was voted CSMTA's Nationally Certified Teacher of the Year in 1996 and her local association's Teacher of the Year in 2015. Through the last 50 years, she has loved music, loved teaching, and loved her students. Mary Ann has presented a variety of programs, including "The Trio Musicale: Chamber Music Experience for Beginning and Intermediate Students" at the 2014 Suzuki Association of the Americas International Conference and the 2015 MTNA National Conference. Her interest in neurolinguistics and multi-sensory learning has led naturally to a recent investigation and presentations about EFT Tapping as a beneficial modality to decrease the stress and anxiety so often experienced by performers at all levels of musical ability.

As a long time member of the Fort Collins Music Teachers Association, Mary Ann has served as president, vice president, and secretary. She has presented many programs to FCMTA as well. She has performed on many two piano programs and enjoyed several masterclasses with Wendel Diebel. She has always loved playing piano and teaching students. All her learning has been for the benefit of her students. Mary Ann has been a staple in the northern Colorado music community for many years. Congratulations on this achievement!

Janet M. Davidson, NCTM grew up on a farm in southeast Nebraska and started piano lessons in first grade. She had the same teacher until she graduated from high school. During high school Janet was an accompanist for the high school choir. She received a Bachelor of Music degree from Nebraska Wesleyan University in 1960 which was also the year she married her husband, Paul, who was in medical school. She taught public school grades 1 through 8 in music and English for two years as

he finished. Then because they moved frequently while he served in the US Public Health Service and finished his training and they had two children, she decided to change directions and so began her career teaching piano and directing church choirs.

Janet began teaching piano lessons in 1966 in Iowa City,



Iowa. In 1969, her husband joined the staff at National Jewish Hospital and their family moved to Denver. She started with a new group of students in southeast Denver. Janet joined Denver Area Music Teachers in 1974 and served as Vice- President, President, (1979-81) and as Achievement Day Chairman for two years after that. In 1981, she appeared on a panel at the MTNA convention in Kansas City to share

information about the 1 hour course credit that a teacher could receive by attending the year's program lectures on a subject taught by a college professor at CU or CSU. In 1983, her husband took a job in southern California and she became active in the MTNA affiliate in that state, the California Association of Professional Music Teachers. Janet served on the audit committee 3 years, as convention registrar 3 years, IMTF chair 2 years, District III Coordinator 4 years, State Student Evaluations Chair 4 years, VP of Districts and Chapters 2 years and as state president 4 years (1996-2000). She became state certified in 1977 and nationally certified in 1981. When her husband retired, they moved back to Colorado (2002) as their children were there and she resumed teaching. Janet was Treasurer of Pikes Peak Music Teachers from 2009-2012. She did not have a large



number of students here in CS and retired in 2013. She is still directing a church choir which has a limited schedule. She has touched many lives with her dedication and teaching.

Martha Watson Violett, NCTM is Emeritus Professor of Music at Western Colorado University where she currently teaches piano and class piano part-time and remains active as soloist and chamber musician with Western faculty, guest artists, and students. Since ITEMS OF INTEREST

beginning her teaching career at Western in 1972 she has also taught music history, theory, and general education music courses and was Chair of the Music Department from 1993 until her retirement in 2010.

She received her undergraduate degree from Illinois Wesleyan University and graduate degrees from the University of Iowa with additional study at the University of Washington. As recipient of a Fulbright scholarship, she studied piano and chamber music at the Hochschule für Musik in Freiburg, Germany, 1970-72. A special interest in the music of Spain's composers inspired research, performance, and lecture-recitals of the Spanish piano repertoire of the past three centuries and her doctoral dissertation on the solo piano music of the Catalonian composer, Xavier Montsalvatge. She was invited to present a recital of Montsalvatge's music in Barcelona in 1993 as one of many celebratory concerts in honor of his eightieth birthday.

Martha is a member of the Montrose Music Teachers Association and has received the Professional National Certification of Teachers of Music from the Music Teachers National Association.

and has received the Professional National Certification of Teachers of Music from the Music Teachers National Association. She has received the Top Music Teacher award from Steinway & Sons and Schmitt Music and in September 2021 was inducted into the Steinway Teacher Hall of Fame in New York City. She enjoys reading and spending time outside in Gunnison but also loves to travel and see the world on foot. Congratulations Martha on this impressive milestone!

Thayne Larsen's music career started when he was 4 years old and went to his first piano lesson. He remembers his mother making him practice for 30 minutes each day. When he was 12 years old his mother upped his practice time to 45 minutes. Thayne's mother was first chair flute in the Utah Symphony and she played at many



functions in Utah. When he was 14, Thayne accompanied her, so his practice time was bumped up to 1 hour per day. He did this until he graduated from high school. Thayne went on active duty for the Army right after graduation, and upon completion he attended the University of Utah to further his musical education. He studied with Ardeen Watts, Gladys Gladstone, and Grant Johannsen.

Thayne began teaching piano at the age of 22 and has been teaching ever since. He joined CSMTA in 1974, and was a

member for about 6 months when he was appointed to be CSMTA secretary. After serving as CSMTA secretary, he became the CSMTA treasurer for many years. Other positions he held with CSMTA include: Auditions chairman, three-time Convention chairman, President-Elect, and President of CSMTA from 1998-2000. He is currently a Member-at-large, giving him over 22 years on the CSMTA board. That is a remarkable accomplishment.

Thayne helped organize the Aurora Music Teachers Association and has been AMTA president twice. He also received the CSMTA Teacher of the Year award in 2020 and received his 50-year pin at the 2024 National Convention. He has enjoyed

serving AMTA and CSMTA over the past 50 years.



David Genova joined the Lamont School of Music at the University of Denver in 1970 as a piano faculty member, teaching undergraduate and graduate students, while maintaining a private studio. Early in his tenure, he initiated Lamont's first Avant-Garde and contemporary music series, organizing annual concerts that featured experimental music with performances and

lectures by faculty and students. This series, which ran until the late 1970s, helped bring attention to underrepresented modern music at the school.

David introduced electronic music to Lamont's curriculum in the 1970s. He was instrumental in acquiring cutting-edge equipment like the ARP 2600 synthesizer and began offering a popular electronic music course in 1974. His course became a requirement for composition majors and continued to evolve, incorporating audio recording and computer software training.

David's interest in computers led him to develop early music education programs for platforms like Atari 800, Commodore 64, and Apple Macintosh. These programs, which focused on ear training, clefs, and chords, were incorporated into Lamont's Music Theory and Ear Training courses. His work in music technology culminated in the creation of a unique undergraduate degree in commercial music, which combined electronic music, recording engineering, and traditional music performance. The program, developed in collaboration with the Engineering and Mass Communications departments, emphasized strong musical training alongside technical skills, a balance that set it apart from other similar programs of the time. level. Customarily, well over 1000 students are involved with Achievement Day. Each student performs privately for an evaluator who listens and adjudicates the level of certificate to be earned. Guidelines for certificate levels and music-related options, including written and aural tests, are found in the CSMTA Student Achievement Day Comprehensive Guidelines. These guidelines also explain how students

can receive the status of "Super Achiever" by completing additional requirements. Local Associations may offer additional unique programs during these events including: master classes, project displays, games, T-shirt design, recitals, scavenger hunts, music technology labs, and more!

2025 Student Theory Activity (STA)

The purpose of the CSMTA Student Theory Activity (STA) is to stimulate theory competency among Colorado music students. The curriculum

and testing use the nationwide Keynote Independent Theory Service (KITS). Complete information about this can be found at www.keynotetheory.com where an order form is available for manuals and student study materials.

The KITS curriculum is divided into 7 levels or "Steps", Primary-Step 6, and will cover reading, theory, vocabulary, listening, and skills (scales, chords and arpeggios). Group testing will be offered at the Rising Stars Festival location or

through local association testing centers approved by the STA Chair. CSMTA offers certificates to all participating students and bronze medals to those scoring 80-89%, silver for 90-94%, and gold for 95% and higher.

All teachers of participating students are required to assist in the administration and grading of the tests.

2025 CSMTA Rising Stars Festival

The CSMTA Rising Stars Festival occurs annually in the spring and offers both competitive and noncompetitive categories in solo piano, solo

voice, solo instrumental, and ensemble divisions. Students are separated by age into five divisions within each category. Two contrasting pieces from any time period or combination of time periods as long as the pieces demonstrate contrasting styles and are by different composers. Newer award: Judges may recognize outstanding performances with a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Award (for pieces by composers who are female and/or who are Black, Indigenous, or People of Color) for both competitive and non-competitive students. All students performing works by DEI composers will receive a gold seal on their certificate. Additionally, judges may

award the new DEI medal to any outstanding performances of DEI works. Teachers must renew their membership prior to December 1, 2024 to receive the member registration rate for Rising Stars. We ask that all participants carefully read through the Student Activity Handbook, available on the CSMTA website, for all rules and regulations as there have been numerous updates for this year's event. music degree, David secured equipment through partnerships with local dealers and established the foundation for computer music, recording, and sound reinforcement courses at Lamont. His leadership in this area led to the national accreditation of the Commercial Music degree, and he became the first director of Lamont's division of Commercial Music and Jazz Studies. He also contributed to the design of the audio and video recording facilities at the Newman Center for the Performing Arts, ensuring that every performance space could serve as a recording venue. His expertise in electronic music and technology played a key role in shaping Lamont's modern facilities.

Beyond his work at the university, David was active in the Colorado State Music Teachers Association (CSMTA) and

spearheaded the revival of their annual concerto competition. He also led workshops for music teachers on the use of computers and software in teaching and gave presentations on contemporary piano music.

In retirement, he continues to teach privately and enjoys spending time with his grandchildren. His lasting impact on Lamont's curriculum, facilities, and music technology programs has left a significant legacy at the University of Denver.

Thank you, Mary Ann, Janet, Martha, Thayne, and David, for your many years of service! As members of CSMTA, we are lucky to have so many wonderful and esteemed teachers in our midst.

Is it Okay to Motivate Students with Rewards?



Homework and chores are things kids are expected to do. When they begin music lessons, practice is added to their to-do list.

Psychological research shows that rewarding kids with what they like for doing what they must do can lead to self-motivation. Immediate gratification can generate long-term discipline. In short, it's okay to

motivate with rewards. Read on to learn why and how to do it. This post is inspired by New York Times best-selling author

Dr. Lisa Damour's podcast episode "How Do I Motivate My Kid to Do Homework."

Someone was stunned when I suggested filling a pillbox with M&Ms to reward music students after a day's practice. Others have objected to the idea of rewarding students for a day's practice. It's like brushing teeth: it's non-negotiable and must be part of the daily routine.

Both objections are understandable.

- 1. Candy: Undeniably capable of pleasing the sweet tooth, candy has little nutritional value, and caregivers may prefer to run a candy-free household.
- 2. Rewards: Home practice is essential—not a choice—for progress when signing up for music lessons. Playing music each day should be the reward in itself.

Unfortunately, that "should" doesn't magically appear when lessons begin.

Most of us hold jobs because we get rewarded with money for our time. A steady income helps pay the bills, and when there's extra cash flow, we can splurge on rewards like hip sneakers, a tropical getaway, or a Steinway B. Admit it, we adults are motivated by rewards, so it's hard to blame kids for wanting them, too.

In her podcast episode "<u>How Do I Motivate My Kid to Do Homework</u>," Dr. Lisa Damour stated that extensive research exists on the two types of motivation: intrinsic and extrinsic. Psychologists equate intrinsic motivation with fascination. It's when you are drawn to something like a book you can't put down. Intrinsic motivation is when work becomes so engaging that the work itself is its own reward.

Extrinsic motivation is equivalent to doing things to avoid getting in trouble or punished (or loss of income!) You do something now to get it over with and to earn something like dessert after eating all your veggies, a paycheck after a hard

week's shift, or screentime after piano practice.

Dr. Damour says that these two mechanisms of motivation work together. "Things can go wrong" when educators or caregivers sense that intrinsic motivation is better. It can go wrong because most kids aren't inclined to be intrinsically motivated all the time. Sometimes they love one activity over another, or they're really into something on Tuesday but not on Saturday. Dr. Damour advises that teachers and caregivers get practical and "stack the deck." She suggests that these two types of motivation are gears that inch students toward progress. When intrinsic motivation kicks in, welcome it! When it disappears, switch to extrinsic motivators to complete the "must-dos." Flipping the switch between these two gears can be applied in music study, too.

Rookie students may resent practice, as it takes up the free time they had before lessons began. To ease their "pain," schedule a treat or favorite activity immediately after practice. Follow up twenty minutes of practice with twenty minutes of screen time, a favorite piece of candy, or outdoor play. Sweetening up the home practice routine will get students practicing regularly. When regular practice happens, progress happens, and when progress happens, intrinsic motivation can kick in.

More seasoned students may not feel like practicing because there's a difficult section to tackle. Tasking themselves to eat the frog-doing the hard thing first-and treating themselves afterward keeps the progress gears turning.

"When I get this practiced, then I get to..."

Eventually, this reward system morphs, and students "gift" themselves the pleasure of playing their favorite pieces after practicing the hard stuff. This is intrinsic motivation at its finest and the ultimate goal! Dr. Damour's advice to stack extrinsic motivators with intrinsic motivators gets music students on the path to progress. Candy is just one way to turn the extrinsic gear. Find alternatives that work for your studio and home practice. Someday, students may autonomously shift motivation gears as needed and consider practicing something non-negotiable, like brushing their teeth.
